National Curriculum objectives

To begin this unit, the children should have already learnt:

Line/Detail + Observation);

Show increased control over lines. (YR2)

Encourage children to look carefully, to observe and include more detail (YR2)

(Texture/Pattern):

Show some control creating different marks to form patterns and different textures, for example dots, lines, shapes. (YR2)

(Shading);

Discuss use of shadows, use of light and dark (YR2)

(Colour mixing/knowledge);

Make colour wheel: primary to secondary colour mixing (YR1)

Colour Wheel: primary to secondary colours mixing, contrasting colour. (YR2)

Adding light and dark (YR2)

(Application of paint);

Paint applied with greater variety of brushes to try and copy effects. (YR2)

The learning in this unit will prepare the children to learn these things in the future:

Continue to practise close observation to add detail and texture to form accurate drawings

(Texture/Pattern):

Explore environmental and manmade patterns and textures for example tessellation for desired effects.

(Shading);

Identify and draw the effect of light including tone and shadow

(Perspective);

Begin to look at scale and proportion in drawing

(Recording/Self Governing/Evaluation);

Use sketches as a way of recording ideas, planning other work, record work in a clear sequence in sketchbooks.

(Colour mixing/knowledge);

Beginning to experiment colour matching, Self-lead colour mixing.

Experimenting with intensity of colour.

(Application of paint);

Paint applied taking greater care. Using a greater variety of brushes or applicators to achieve a planned effect.

Key Enquiry Question

How did artists represent their experiences during WWII?

The Big Idea:

Research project into photography and art during London Blitz, emphasis on underground sketches of Henry Moore in order to create own work.

Vocabulary:

Line: charcoal, pencil, crayon, chalk, pastels, wax crayon, thick, thin, soft, broad, narrow, fine, pattern, line, shape, detail, bold, field sketch.

Texture: pattern texture, proportion, emotion, expression, smooth, rough, wrinkly, bumpy, hatching, cross hatching, media marks, pencil, techniques, stippling, blending, rubbing, shading, pressure, movement.

Shape: forms, shapes, third dimension, shape names, curving, wavy, straight, proportion, parallel.

Tones: variations in tone.

techniques in order to create their own work. Take the time to reflect upon what they like and dislike about their work in order to improve it. About and describe the work of some artists (Henry Moore + other WWII photographers+ artists – Wilfred Stanley Haines.) And be able to explain how to use some of the tools and techniques they have chosen.
